## What We Built in 2025 & What Comes Next

Alaskans are living during a time of both promise and uncertainty.

Over the last few years, significant public investments have been made in Alaska and they are delivering benefits like expanded broadband and safer public facilities. They created new jobs and new opportunities in communities across the state. But 2025 also made clear that progress is not guaranteed. Shifting federal priorities, funding delays, tariffs, and ongoing state budget pressures have made it harder for communities to plan with confidence.

Build Alaska's Future Education Fund is a charitable, nonprofit organization focused on strengthening public trust through transparency and good governance. Through BuildAlaska.org, we provide clear, reliable information to citizens and communities about public funding: what is the source, where it is going, and how does it benefit Alaska's economy and communities.

Because of the essential role federal receipts continue to play in Alaska, it is important to provide this information to the public. This work is powered by public-minded support: countless volunteer hours; funding and gifts from hundreds of individual Alaskans; grants from Alaska institutions including The Rasmuson Foundation and RurAL CAP; and strong collaboration with the Alaska Municipal League and the Alaska Association of Municipal Clerks. 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## Build Alaska's Future Education Fund: Empowering Communities Through Transparency, Trust, and Accountability

Build Alaska's Future Education Fund ([BuildAlaska.org](http://BuildAlaska.org)) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to strengthening public trust, fostering civic engagement, activating a thriving workforce, and equipping communities for good governance through transparent, accessible, and credible information.

### What Made 2025 Possible

## ClerkStart: Strengthening Alaska's Civic Workforce

Across Alaska's 230+ municipal and tribal communities, clerks are the trusted guardians of local government. They safeguard public records, keep meetings and decisions transparent, and run elections with integrity. Their work is often invisible, but it is essential to public trust.

In 2025, Build Alaska's Future Education Fund launched ClerkStart to elevate these unsung heroes and show that this isn't just a job—it's a profession and a calling. During the 60th Annual Alaska Association of Municipal Clerks Conference and the Alaska Municipal League's 75th Anniversary Conference, we filmed interviews with 18 municipal clerks from across the state, from Hydaburg to Cold Bay. A video series is now in post-production for release in early 2026, highlighting the skill, ethics, and steady leadership clerks bring to their communities, and inspiring the next generation to consider this vital public service path.

ClerkStart was launched with support from the Rasmuson Foundation and RurAL CAP, in partnership with the Alaska Association of Municipal Clerks and the Alaska Municipal League.


## 2025 Highlights: Transforming Opportunities into Action

### Transparency That Communities Can Use

The [BuildAlaska.org interactive GIS map](#) remains a cornerstone of our work. The map provides **objective, fact-based information** on federal and state investments across Alaska and tracks nearly **\$10 billion in infrastructure funding** across more than 3,000 projects.

The platform is designed to help communities better understand funding allocations, identify local hiring and workforce opportunities, and track delays or interruptions that may affect project delivery. At a time when federal tracking tools became harder to access nationally, this platform helped fill critical information gaps.

By increasing transparency and access to reliable information, the map supports informed workforce planning and strengthens public understanding of how infrastructure investments translate into jobs and community benefits.



## Turning Data Into Stories



### Anchorage on the Move: Safer Streets for All

A Summer Series Highlighting Infrastructure, Schools, and Sustainability Projects

In 2025, we expanded the 'Know Your Investment, Voice Your Future' StoryMap series, which pairs mapping data with narrative context, photos, and community perspectives.

StoryMaps highlighted broadband expansion in Western Alaska, school facility and safety improvements, pedestrian and transportation projects, and community-scale public spaces. These tools help people understand not just what is being funded, but why it matters, for safety, access, education, and long-term resilience.

## Informed Economic Dialogue

In May 2025, Build Alaska's Future Education Fund co-hosted the **Alaska Economic Forum** with Commonwealth North and the University of Alaska Anchorage Institute of Social and Economic Research (ISER).

The forum brought together economists, workforce leaders, policymakers, and the public to examine how federal investments and employment affect Alaska's economy, workforce demand in energy, mining, and infrastructure, and the risks posed by funding volatility and delays. By grounding the conversation in data and expert analysis, the forum supported informed, constructive discussion at a critical moment for the state.

## Alaska Fiscal Visioning: Learning From the Past to Plan for the Future

Recognizing that today's challenges are not new, Build Alaska's Future also compiled **Alaska Fiscal Visioning – Planning Efforts, Convenings, and Resources** in 2025.

This living record brings together more than **50 years of Alaska's fiscal planning efforts**, including commissions, task forces, legislative work, and civic forums. It preserves institutional memory and shared lessons to help future economic planning build on what has already been tried, debated, and learned.

Consistent with our mission, this resource is educational and nonpartisan and does not promote specific policy solutions.

## Rural and Alaska Native Workforce Development

Throughout 2025, Build Alaska's Future Education Fund laid the groundwork for expanded rural and Alaska Native workforce development efforts that will launch in 2026.

Working with labor organizations, tribal governments, and training institutions, including the **Fairbanks Pipeline Training Center** and the **Alaska Laborers Training School**, we aligned workforce education with real job demand in construction, energy, mining, and resource development. This work helps ensure that rural residents are better positioned to access training pathways tied directly to infrastructure investment and local employment opportunities.

## Looking Ahead to 2026

As Alaska enters 2026, communities continue to navigate significant public investment alongside growing uncertainty about the timing, continuity, and local impacts of that funding. In this environment, clear, credible information and strong local capacity matter more than ever.

Build Alaska's Future Education Fund will focus on the following priorities:

- We will continue to strengthen our transparency tools by updating and expanding our interactive maps and StoryMaps to reflect funding changes, project delays, and emerging needs. These tools help communities, workforce partners, and the public understand where investments are occurring and how they affect local planning and opportunity.
- We will launch rural and Alaska Native workforce workshops and training pathways aligned with real job demand in construction, energy, mining, and infrastructure. Working with labor organizations, tribal governments, and training institutions, this work will help connect public investment to local employment and skills development.
- We will invest in local governance capacity by releasing the ClerkStart video statewide and advancing conversations about civic careers, mentorship, and succession in municipal and tribal government.

As ever, our role remains nonpartisan and educational. We translate complex public investment information into accessible tools and shared understanding, helping communities plan with confidence and participate more fully in shaping Alaska's future.
